



I believe that by my own reason or strength I cannot believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him. Well, that seems to be exactly what most people do not believe. I believe that I cannot believe in Jesus? Again, that seems to be exactly what most people do not believe. How often have I heard that we must not only believe, but "really believe"? The quotation above comes from Martin Luther and his Small Catechism, the explanation to the Third Article of the Apostles' Creed (I believe in Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting.) Somehow it always comes down to something that I must do, down to my faith, down to my belief, down to me living in a certain way. Too often what it never comes down to is what God has done, is doing, and will do. There is something deep within us that wants to take the credit for the work of God and for what God is doing for us. Luther corrects this misunderstanding, this sin, of wanting to put ourselves in the place of God (the sin of Adam and Eve in the garden).

Luther is not alone in this understanding. Luther is simply following St. Paul. In Paul's first letter to the Church in Corinth (1 Corinthians 12:3), he writes Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking in the Spirit of God ever says, "Jesus be accursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except in the Holy Spirit. And there is the key: "no one can say Jesus is Lord except in the Holy Spirit." To be able to say that Jesus is Lord, to be able to believe that Jesus is one's Lord and Savior is done only by the power of the Holy Spirit. It is the work of the Triune God, of God the Holy Spirit, for you and me to believe in Jesus as our Lord and Savior. By my own reason or strength I am unable to do it,

no matter how much someone tells me to believe and have faith. Rather, my belief and my faith is all the work of God through the Holy Spirit. Luther continues his explanation of the Third Article by saying, But the Holy Spirit has called me through the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, and sanctified and preserved me in true faith, just as He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian faith on earth and preserves it in union with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian Church He daily and abundantly forgives all my sins, and the sins of all believers, and on the last day will raise me and all the dead and will grant eternal life to me and to all who believe in Christ. This is most certainly true.

Our standing before God is dependent on God and on God alone. God does it all. God's love for each of us is so great that He created us and sustains us with all that we have and need (First Article), redeems us from our sin through the life, death, and resurrection of His Son (Second Article) and then creates and sustains in us the faith to believe that all this is true and that Jesus is our Lord (Third Article).

Why do I bring this up now? Sunday, May 24<sup>th</sup>, was the Festival of Pentecost. As Jesus ascended into heaven He promised that He would send us an Advocate who would be with us (John 16:4-15). This is God the Holy Spirit and on the Festival of Pentecost we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit sent by God to His Church. We are who we are, new people in Jesus Christ, all, let me say that again, all, because of what God did, does, and will do for us. What does that cause us to do? The only thing that we can do is thank, praise, serve, and obey God. (Continued on following page)

That is our response. And, even this is all the work of God the Holy Spirit. God does it all. What a great and wonderful God we have!



### The Season after Pentecost – Ordinary Time



Beginning fifty days after Easter, the Christian Church celebrates the Season After Pentecost, also known as Ordinary Time. It is a season that starts with one of the most important days of the Church calendar – the Day of Pentecost.

The Day of Pentecost is recorded in the Bible in Acts 2:1-21 and is widely thought to be the official beginning of the Christian Church. It was in that event that God sent the Holy Spirit to lead and empower God's people to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with all nations. It was the point where God again invited all believers to join in God's mission in the world.

There's no consensus on how these Sundays came to be known by the term "ordinary." It comes either from the *ordinal* numbering of the Sundays (first, second, last) or—more simply and more likely—from the ordinary English word *ordinary*, meaning common, usual or customary. Unfortunately, the definition of ordinary also carries the connotations "unexceptional," "uninteresting" or "unsurprising." This time is no break from the splendor of the church year. Instead, it is a celebration of the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit in the church. Through the Word and the Sacrament, we explore the themes of justification, sin, grace, love, obedience, endurance and hope. This is truly the "Time of the Church."

Throughout the Season after Pentecost/Ordinary Time (which stretches until the season of <u>Advent</u>) we reflect on how Jesus' life and ministry are an example of how God's mission is lived out in the world. Like nature around us, which is blossoming and growing, the Season after Pentecost is a season of intentional growth in our faith and discipleship. It is a season where we learn to see how, as Jesus puts it, "the kingdom of God has come near." The Sundays after Pentecost make up the longest portion of the Church Year. This is the Time of the Church—the time we focus on growing together in the life of the Holy Trinity.

Green is the color for the season after Pentecost. Green is the color of growing plants and life. As growing plants need water and nourishment, so we can only grow by living in our Baptism and receiving the Lord's Word and Sacraments.

The appointed Gospels for the Sundays after Pentecost are full of Jesus' teachings, such as His parables, words of wisdom, and debates with the Pharisees. We also hear the Word of the prophets (Old Testament), who are inspired by the Spirit to foretell Jesus' coming, and the word of the apostles (Epistle), sent forth by Jesus to preach in the power of the Spirit. The Time of the Church is a time to grow in godly knowledge. Through His Word, Jesus is still making disciples of all those who will follow Him.
