Pastor's View

Lent – Lent starts this Ash Wednesday on February 10, 2016. Easter will be March 27, 2016. Lent is a season of prayer and worship. Lent is the season in which the early church and some churches now begin to prepare their new members for baptism at Easter. So Lent is the time to do some sort of Spiritual Discipline. So Lent is the time to give something up or to add something to our daily spiritual life. Giving up sweets (chocolate) has some benefit to our spiritual life if we add an act of going towards God in some manner. Using a devotional is also beneficial. But you may think, I won't read the Bible or I won't read the devotional book, then what? It may be a spiritual mantra that might help. Why not say a short prayer lots of times in the day. One saying would be, "Thank you Lord Jesus for this day." It doesn't have to be a good or great day or a bad day; what is important is that you are remembering Jesus during this Lenten season. If possible spend some time that is quiet time for you. Your faith will grow as you spend time with Jesus. Maybe it would be great to spend time drawing what your hands want to put on the paper. Reading and Knowing Bible Stories – Is it possible to learn one Bible story a week? I have noticed that Bible stories do not come to mind when there is a discussion. Can we hear the Bible story or read the Bible story so we can be grounded in biblical truths. Knowing the stories is important to knowing Jesus. Knowing Jesus is the only way we can know God. As we know the story we can share it with our friends when it is the right time. Faith brings us the desire to know. Knowledge brings us the desire to share. Sharing brings our friends into faith. And then we want to know more. It is a wonderful circle of life.

'We call them by their names'

There is a story my mother tells about visiting Washington, D.C., when she was 13. As she and her cousin walked down the street, people stared at them. Someone pushed my mother abruptly and gave her a look that said "You don't belong here; you're the wrong color." As they continued to walk and talk about what had just happened, her cousin asked, "What do you call black people in Puerto Rico?" My mother replied, "We call them by their names."

Wherever I go people are always trying to guess what I am or where I'm from. I've been called Filipina, black, mixed, Bolivian. I even argued with a bus driver about what part of India I was "obviously" from. It all depends on who is looking, and this interaction often shapes the welcome I receive.

Growing up I didn't think a lot about race. It wasn't something we talked about, even though we knew of it in the same way people know there is a World Cup. For a long time I thought racism only meant hating someone because of the color of his or her skin, and that race was something in your blood, something you were born with.

My ability to see and understand what racism is, to recognize how I am affected and made part of it, has come in many forms. But two moments stand out in my memory.

The first was when I truly understood that race is also a social construct. I was at a White Privilege Conference, which examines concepts of privilege, with others who were wrestling with similar questions. Historically racism was a system put in place to dismantle a movement that would lead to a union among slaves—both black and white—advocating for fair treatment and wages, the keynote speaker said. This system didn't elevate the white lower class so they could rub elbows with those in power. Instead it made the line at the bottom of the food chain even lower for people of color. We are part of that system today even though we have grown in our acceptance and tolerance of each other.

The second moment was when I asked a friend about something I had heard—that most African-Americans know someone who is or has been in jail. "Why is this reality? This doesn't make sense," I said, feeling frustrated. She replied, "It shouldn't make sense, but it doesn't make it any less true." And she was right. The fact that I couldn't see these realities surrounding me or that this was not part of my experience didn't make it any less true. Lately the problem of racism has been showing up more and more in the U.S. media. Even if you don't notice it every day, racism exists and is part of our story. As people of faith, we can no longer remain silent when confronted with the sin of racism—our inaction makes us accomplices. We can only face this together.

I want my nephew, those I love and even those I don't care for to live in a world where we see each other as simply and wonderfully made in God's image. I pray that God will give us the courage to listen, share our stories and call each other by name.
